Personal

DR. JASPER TAPPAN PHILLIPS of St. Louis, Missouri, delivered a lecture on "Six Health Hints," in Alton, Illinois, on September 2, 1962, to the congregation of the Church of God in Christ at 1231 Belt Street.

Deaths

DR. WILLIAM WARRICK CARDOZO, died suddenly, August 11, 1962, at Washington Hospital Center. He had practiced pediatrics in Washington, D.C. since 1937. Dr. Cardozo was born in Washington, D.C., April 6, 1905. He received the B.S. in 1929 and the M.D. in 1933 from Ohio State University. After an internship in City Hospital in Cleveland, he was a resident in pedia-

trics at Provident Hospital in Chicago, 1934-35. This was followed by a two-year General Education Board fellowship in pediatrics at Children's Memorial Hospital and Provident Hospital. During this period, he did research on sickle cell anemia and published in 1937 a report entitled, "Immunologic Studies in Sickle Cell Anemia."

Upon return to his native Washington, D.C. for private practice, he joined the staff of the Howard University College of Medicine and Freedmen's Hospital in 1937 as instructor in pediatrics (part time). He was subsequently promoted to clinical assistant professor and later to clinical associate professor of pediatrics. He was certified by the American Board of Pediatrics in 1942, and became a fellow of the American Academy of Pediatrics in 1948.

In recent years, his interest centered upon gastrointestinal disorders in children. For the past 17 years, he has been an active participant in the gastroenterology clinic at Freedmen's Hospital. In addition, Dr. Cardozo served for 24 years as a school medical inspector in the District of Columbia Department of Health.

He was a member of the American Academy of Pediatrics, the Medical Society of the District of Columbia, the Advisory Committee of the District of Columbia Crippled Children's Society, the National Medical Association, and Alpha Omega Alpha, having been one of the Gamma Chapter of the latter honorary medical fraternity in the Howard University College of Medicine. He was a member of the Alpha Phi Alpha fraternity and an Episcopalian. His hobby was photography.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Julia M. Cardozo, a daughter, Judy, and five sisters, Mrs. Margaret Holmes, Mrs. Elizabeth Barker, Mrs. Emmeta Mounsey, Mrs. Catherine R. Lewis, and Mrs. Frances Payne, all of Washington, D.C.

The Washington Star of August 17, 1962, paid the following tribute to Dr. Cardozo in an editorial:

W. W. Cardozo

"It was highly fitting that the memorial services for Dr. W. Warrick Cardozo emphasized his contributions to the children of this city, for they exceeded those of the ordinary pediatrician. Apart from his private practice, Dr. Cardozo spent a part of each working day for more than 20 years as a salaried public school medical examiner for the D. C. Health Department. His real love, however, was his voluntary service over the years as a one-man medical staff for the Ionia R. Whipper Home for Unwed Mothers, the only home of its kind in Washington for Negroes. The standards of medical care which he inaugurated and maintained contributed largely to the qualification of the home several years ago as an agency of the United Givers Fund.

"Somehow, he also managed to find time to engage in a variety of other local professional and civic activities, including the D. C. Health and Welfare Council and the Rock Creek East Neighborhood League. The recollection of one prominent colleague in these ventures is that Dr. Cardozo was "a worker" who had little interest in honorary titles. It is for these largely unheralded

services, however, that he will be widely remembered and sorely missed."

DR. HERBERT NATHANIEL WHITE (M.D., Meharry, '27) of Asheville, N.C., died on February 22, 1962 at the age of 66. He was a veteran of World War I and was associated with Memorial Mission Hospital.

DR. LEO R. RATCLIFF (M.D., Meharry, '28) of Center, Texas, died in Forth Worth Tex., on February 28, 1962 at the age of 63.

DR. GEORGE LEE WINSTEAD (M.D., Leonard, '08) of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, died on March 7, 1962 of carcinoma of the kidney at the age of 81. He was a member of the Board of Trustees of Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte, N.C.

DR. JOSEPH FRANK LAIRD (M.D., Meharry, '31) of Gallatin, Tennessee, died on March 14, 1962 at the age of 59 in Nashville.

DR. ARISTOTLE LORENZO CHATMAN (M.D., Meharry, '32) of Baton Rouge, Louisiana, died in Baton Rouge General Hospital on April 4, 1962 at the age of 59.

DR. CLEVELAND L. JACKSON (M.D., Howard, '30) of San Diego, California, died on April 9 at the age of 66 of coronary thrombosis. He was a veteran of World War I and was associated with the Mercy Hospital.

DR. ARTHUR BERNARD BENSON (M.D., Meharry, '33) of Tuskegee, Alabama, died on April 16, 1962 at the age of 54. He was chief of the continued treatment service at the Hospital in Tuskegee.

DR. EARL LUCUS GOODEN (M.D., Howard, '21) of Chicago, Illinois, died on May 26, 1962 at the age of 66 in the Albert Merritt Billings Hospital, of bacterial pneumonia and acute leukemia.

DR. JAMES OTTO HILL (M.D., Meharry, '25) of Newark, New Jersey, died on May 27, 1962 at the age of 70. He was a member of the American Academy of General Practice, a veteran of World War I and served four terms in the state assembly.

DR. JAMES MADISON WALDEN (M.D., Meharry, '40) of Kansas City, Missouri, died on June 10, 1962, of myocardial infarction. He was 50. Dr. Walden served his internship in Homer G. Phillips Hospital and served a residency in Wheatley-Provident Hospital. In addition, he was associated with Douglas Hospital in Kansas City, Kansas and Queen of the World Hospital.
